BACKGROUND OFFERED ON ETHIOPIA'S ANTI-MALARIA CAMPAIGN ISSUES

Thanks are extended to John Moohr, Chicago, for providing a copy of the Imperial Ethiopian Government's brochure published in conjunction with the April 7, 1962, anti-malaria issues (Scott #s 383-5).

The full text is reproduced below. It offers a mini-primer on the disease, a mini-history on eradication efforts, and the Ministry of Posts, Telegraphs and Telephones announcement.







The scourge of malaria has plagued man since the beginning of time. It is estimated that prior to World War II over 100 million cases and approximately three million deaths annually resulted from this dreaded disease, making it the number one public health problem on earth.

Malaria, a blood disease, is transmitted through the bite of the Anopheline mosquito. An infected mosquito literally injects the parasite into the blood stream of man. The parasite evolves through several stages and destroys blood cells, either causing death or incapacitation to the victim. Individuals recovering from an attack of malaria and bitten by a non-infected mosquito, in turn are capable of infecting the Anopheline, thus completing the chain of malaria transmission, mosquito-man-mosquito.

Realizing the importance of the malaria problem, the Pan American Sanitary Bureau began investigations in 1951 to consider the feasibility of eradicating the disease from the Western Hemisphere. The results obtained from these studies were so favourable that in 1955 the World Health Assembly (United Nations) adopted a resolution recommending that malaria eradication activities be instituted throughout the world.

Such a program has come to reality. It encompasses the entire globe and is the first and most dramatic world-wide public health campaign in history. Primary consideration is given to the need for breaking the chain of malaria transmission through control of adult Anapheline mosquitoes. This is being accomplished by applying DDT and other residual type insecticides inside human dwellings one to three times per year for three to four consecutive years followed by a consolidation period lasting another three to four years.

The first pilot project in Ethiopia began in 1955 and was a joint Ethiopia-United States operation. This was followed by a WHO-assisted pilot project in 1957. Both projects concluded that malaria eradication was technically feasible in the Empire. As a result of this conclusion, the Government accepted the principle of malaria eradication and decreed an Imperial Order November 22 of 1959 in the Negarit Gazetta providing for the establishment of a national Malaria Eradication Service within the Ministry of Public Health with all the necessary elements for the initiation of the campaign and the achievement of the final objective by stages. BACKGROUND ON ETHIOPIA'S ANTI-MALARIA ISSUES (continued from page 1)

The Malaria Eradication Service has now engaged about 250 employees, with material and equipment, in various parts of the country combatting the disease and protecting about 7% of the estimated ten million population living in malarious areas of the Empire.

REALIZING the significance of active cooperation in malaria eradication as the greatest international health endeavour ever undertaken in the world,

RECOGNIZING the value of the intensive world-wide informative and educational activities in such an undertaking,

KNOWING that malaria in Ethiopia constitutes a serious public health problem of the first order,

NOTING the efforts being undertaken by the Imperial Ethiopian Government, Ministry of Public Health to eradicate the disease.

HAVING carefully reviewed the WHO Executive Board resolutions and related correspondence on the issuing of special postage stamps commemorating the world-wide campaign for the eradication of malaria, The Imperial Ethiopian Government, Ministry of Posts, Telegraphs and Telephones joins in cooperating in the world-wide campaign against malaria by issuing special postage stamps. From the total of this issue 20% will be donated to the WHO to benefit its funds.

Design of the stamps depicts the interest and effort of all nations in their common fight gainst the Anopheline mosquito, thus ridding the world of one of man's oldest and most delibitating scourges -- malaria.

Issue date of the stamps commemorates World Health Day, April 7. The series is printed in three denominations, each of different colour.



Editor's Note: The "official" WHO list published in Vol. 1, No. 1 was not created by the editor. As reported, it was extracted from the World Health Organization Director-General's report made May 11, 1963, listing the 144 official participating postal administrations and dates of issue. As North Vietnam was not listed in the WHO report, it can be assumed it was not "official". The issue dates listed by the WHO's Director-General were noted as questionable based on those appearing in current standard reference catalogs -- but they are the dates as published by WHO.

SIR WM. OSLER, M.D. MISSED

. . . you may already have this information, but this stamp was not listed in your bulletin:

Canada - 1969 - Scott #495 - Sir William T. Osler. (1849-1919) After he confirmed Laveran's discovery, this Canadian physician insisted that no one in his clinic would make a diagnosis of malaria unless it was based on an examination of blood smears. (His clinic was in the U.S.) It was largely due to his subsequest writing and teachning of this and other principles of malaria diagnosis and treatment that the confusing hybrid disease, typho-malaria, was driven out of text books and medical meetings.

RUMOR OR FACT

QUESTIONS ON THE MALARIA TOPIC IN NEED OF ANSWERS

- Although Mexico appears on most existing checklists as issuing the first stamp (RA14 issued in 1939) related to malaria, can not Surinam's B4-7 issued in 1928 have the honor? - JD
- A. The reason for issue of Surinam B4-7 relates to "indigenous diseases" which is a far too broad-range purpose to qualify for specific relationship to malaria. A more appropriate choice would be Canal Zone 105 portraying General William C. Gorgas (issued October 3, 1928). General Gorgas' role in military medical history is well known, especially his control of malaria and yellow fever in Cuba (1898) and Panama (early 1900s).—R. Ward, D.C. - Bhutan has been stated as having produced an appropriate overprint during the 1962 WHO Anti-Malaria campaign. Has such a stamp been seen or added to anyone's collection? - A. Steffen, D.C.

The illustrated 33ch anti-malaria essay was printed for Bhutan by Harrison and Sons in London, but was not issued due to the illustration of Buddha. According to G. Alveizos, noted California dealer, only one sheet of 100 is known to exist and a copy of this rare essay was sold at his public auction in 1977. Mr. Alevizos states he has also "seen a picture of another demonimation of the same design, but know nothing further than this." No information on any related anti-

malaria overprint (as done in Mauritania) has been found. Thanks to C. Clemmer, Chicago, for the tip that put us in contact with Mr. Alevizos. - JD

- 3. Do you have any information on what part, if any, that the following named man played in any field of malaria? Scott #250 (1954) Algeria, E. Millon. E. Shoup, Akron
- A. Auguste Nicolas Eugene Millon (1812-1867) was an Army Surgeon who in 1850 assumed the post of Chief Pharmacist for the army in Algeria. Millon is best known as a chemist. Combining both interests while in Algeria, Millon did studies on the treatment of malaria. JD

- 4. What Malaria Topical albums are available? J. Palmieri, APO San Francisco
- A. Three albums have been reported in use, to date. None are "available" as a dealer shelf item. They were published to support the 1962 WHO Anti-Malaria campaign: Ayal Publications: White Ace, Washington Press; and Lindner (hingeless). Information on availability of these or other malaria albums will be reported as received.

PERSONALITIES

- Carl von Linne (Carolus Linnaeus), 18th century botanist was the first to formally classify Cinchona Bogotensis as a byproduct of his development of the binominal method for naming/classifying specimens. His system was published in 1735 -
- "Natural System". As the holder of a medical degree from the University of Harderwijck in Holland, von Linne also held beliefs that malaria was a water-born para-
- sitic disease. Postally has has been honored by six nations for his work as a
- botanist/natural scientist: Bulgaria 994; German Democratic Republic 389; Norway G
- 356; Romania 1217; Russia 1955; and Sweden 294, 296, 298.

He is qualified as a malaria personality related to two sub-topics: theory of cause and treatment (specifically quinine).

Julius Wagner-Jauregg (1875-1940) a neurologist and psychiatrist, won the Nobel Prize for Medicine in 1927 for his treatment of general paralysis of the insane with fever by the injection of malaria parasites into the patient and subsequent curing of the malaria by quinine. Austria honored him philatelically in 1957 (Scott 615).

Credit for the material on Dr. Wagner-Jauregg goes to R. Bindie, MD, who forwarded a copy of a staff newletter from his hospital, in which it appeared.

CHECKLIST UPDATES / NOTES OFFERED

1962 Cambodia did not issue souvenier sheets of 106-8. The listing should be for mini-sheetlets of 4 similar to those issued by Hungary for 1461. They were issued perferate with gum and imperferate without gum. - C. Clemmer, Chicago

All imperferate issues for current or former French Community of Nations (Algeria and Cambodia listed in the last issue) are normally issued at least 12 months after the original issue date. Thus, first day covers - when produced and available - do not carry the catalog listed issue date but the release date for the imperforate version. - C. Clemmer, Chicago

Checklist identification numbers used have no meaning except for the last digit, as noted, which indicates the catalog source for the identification number used in the description. Checklist ID numbers are assigned to facilitate automatic sorting to prepare the master checklist and supplemental (sub-topic) check lists. - JD
