POSEN LOCAL POST WITH A-M THEME

Past articles featuring local post stamps with anti-malaria themes have featured Lundy and Herm Islands and the Indian state of Nagaland. Now another local post issue with the a-m theme has been reported. This issue is from the Posen Local Post.

The Posen Local Post is operated by Mr. James Czyl of Posen, Illinois. In 1971 he prepared a multiple-design plate of stamps; one design was the a-m thematic shown above. The design was taken from the 9d a-m issue of Papua-New Guinea. The plate was used to print 2,000 sheets of stamps, of which 1,000 sheets were cut into imperforate singles and 1,000 sheets were rouletted. Since all stamps in all sheets were separated, no se-tenant multiples exist. In each group of 1,000 sheets were 125 sheets of each of eight different colors: pale yellow, yellow, goldenrod, pink, red, light blue, and light green. This means that existing sets consist of eight stamps and can be found either imperforate or rouletted. 125 complete a-m sets exist in each format.

The stamps were issued June 1, 1971, in Posen, Illinois. No official first day covers were prepared, and the first day of use was not recorded. The stamps are still valid and still in use franking mail for Mr. Czyl and others.

Locally lithographed on ungummed paper, all stamps bear the 9d value.

FOLLOW UP ON

MALARIA ADS ON INLAND LETTER SHEETS OF INDIA

[When preparing Carol Turner's excellent article on India's inland letter cards and sheets with malaria ads (MP #17), the editor mislabeled some of the dialects. This follow-up is intended to correct those errors and to add new information that has been received. A checklist for known types and varieties is also presented with proposed numbering for the malaria handbook. The letter cards were reviewed in the previous issue.]

Since this is a first-draft listing of India's inland letter sheets bearing malaria-related messages, readers are asked to compare the data with letter sheets in their own collections and then provide feedback to the editor for inclusion in revisions.

The individual listing for each item begins with "LS" to denote "letter sheet." Next is a number corresponding to the listed message types, and then comes a lower case letter corresponding to an illustrated franking type. Finally, a dash is followed by a two-letter code to designate the language or dialect in which the malaria message is printed.

The color of the letter sheets ranges from the blue to blue-green shades of aerograms. All printing on the sheets is blue. The sheets measure approximately 25 x 19 cm high, plus flaps for sealing; and they are designed to fold to a sealed size of approximately 13 x 10 cm. The malaria ad is on the reverse of a folded sheet.

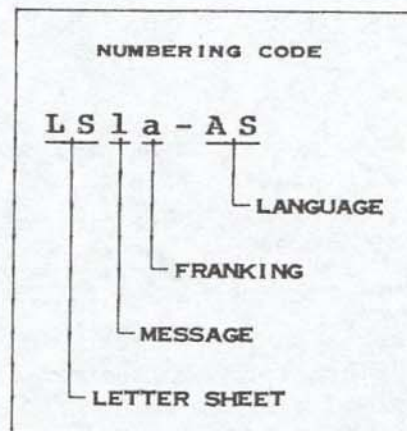

PERSONALITIES ON POSTAGE

Albrecht Durer (1471-1528) contracted malaria during a trip in 1520 to the province of Zeeland in Holland, and he suffered from the disease for the rest of his life. Malaria philatelists who collect stamps noting famous people that had malaria will, therefore, surely want to include the name of this well-known German painter and engraver in their lists.

Since the combined postal emissions (which contains many "sand dune" issues as well as an amount of postal stationary) featuring Durer can make up an extensive topical collection by themselves, the malaria philatelist should probably restrict his collection to a few stamps that portray the artist himself, such as the 1926 German issue (Sc. 362) or varieties of the 1961 FRG (Sc. 827) and Berlin (Sc. 9N179) definitive issues.

The following table of Durer-related issues is restricted only in that all issues are Scott-listed. To make the collector's search easier (and cheaper!), sets that include the artist's portrait are marked with an asterisk (*).

THE READING ROOM

THE RISE AND FALL OF MALARIA IN EUROPE: A Historico-epidemiological Study, by L. J. Bruce-Chwatt and J. deZulueta. 1980, Oxford University Press, London and New York. 240 pages. \$45.00.

After briefly outlining the origins of malaria in Europe and sketching its history there, the authors give a country-by-country account of the disease. Presented in each account is the history of malaria in a country (including causes, impact, and folk remedies), personalities involved in research, details of attempts to eradicate the malaria, and the types and outcomes of anti-malaria programs pursued. The latter portion of each account details the types of malaria and dominant vectors in the country and mentions current problems. (Most European countries have still to be alert to "airport" malaria and that carried by immigrants, visitors, and soldiers.)

The authors conclude the book with details of international organizations' involvement in anti-malaria work in Europe and then a look to the future of the global struggle against malaria.

Written in non-technical language, the book offers historical insights and a wealth of information about its subject. For the malaria philatelist, the historical accounts provide source material for developing a thematic collection outlining the course of malaria in Europe and the people who did much of the work of controlling the disease.

PERSONALITIES - CONTINUED

Giuseppe Garibaldi (1807-1882), Italian revolutionist, was slowed in his 1848 campaign when malaria afflicted his mother and many of his troops. His wife, Anita, died of malaria in 1849.

It was Garibaldi's Land Reclamation Bill of 1875 that was ultimately revised and became Italy's Act of December 11, 1878, which concerned the hydraulic reclamation of the entire Roman Campagna.

ANTI-MALARIA SLOGAN CANCELS

Photos and notes concerning malaria slogan cancels have sporadically appeared in *Miasma Philatelist*. Here, in a unified setting, is a compilation of that and other data which will provide the reader source material for pursuing those cancels of the anti-malaria campaign era.

Readers may recall the listing of Canadian cities using special a-m cancels and the article revealing that Britain may have issued as many as 350 a-m slogan devices. This listing offers additional information on those countries' slogans, including lists of reported cancel varieties for those and other countries.

Other cancels possibly exist (two shown here were only recently found and reported by MPI members), and readers are urged to supply whatever additional information they can. (Clear, full-size photocopies are always helpful.) Information known to be uncertain or lacking is marked by an asterisk (*), and some data listed from a UNPA bulletin may be inaccurate. Bracketed dates are earliest or latest thus far reported for a cancel. (Help is especially needed for establishing first and last days for cancels and for verification of some British offices.) British offices thus far verified are marked with a plus (+). Finally, the countries listed in Annex 6 of the proceedings of the Sixteenth World Health Assembly, Part I, as "Participants Issuing Special Cancellations Only" are marked with a dot (•).
